Children Learn Better with Engaging Parents.

As kids get older and advance to high school, talking to them about their school life can become more difficult for parents. With younger children, parents may have been required to sign report cards and progress reports, attend more parent-teacher conferences, or simply drive their kids to school. But when students reach high school, connecting with parents can become challenging. Even if parent engagement in academics is hard, it's incredibly important. The most important way for parents to get involved, is to show interest in their teenager's academics at home, attend parent/teacher meetings and meetings held at the school with the principal.

Unfortunately, engagement often tapers off as children get older. So, parents should be "making sure their teenagers are taking the right subjects and maintaining passing grades." Once your child enters high school we as parents should be working with our children on pre-university activities, such as searching for the right university and career for your child.

"It's about making sure that your child is going to be able to leave high school and go to university or start a career". For students who could become the first in their family to seek higher education, "Having an expectation that your child should go to university will have a profound shift for them." While offering support and guidance at home is the first step in engaging in your teenager's high school academics, it's certainly not the last. Families should work with the school, too, specifically by communicating with teachers and giving us helpful background information on your child.

Together as a team (Parents and Educators) we all want the same thing, and that is for your child to succeed. This is an important partnership between the school and the parents. Together we can build trusting and respectful

relationships.

Focusing on the Importance of Learning

 Talk positively about the importance of education.

Let your child see how much you enjoy and value learning.

It is OK if you do not have all the answers to your child's questions, but it is important to show that you know how to find the answers.

 Learning builds confidence; and a child who is confident is more open to new opportunities to learn.

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Providing Homework Support

 Set a regular time each day for doing homework. That time should be free of distractions such as TV and phone calls.

- Be sure your child has a place to do homework that is quiet and well lit. Make sure all the appropriate materials -such as paper and pencils -are available.
- Let your child know that homework is important and valuable. Consistently review your child's homework during homework time.

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Communicating With The School Year-Round

 Stay attuned to your child's academic accomplishments on a weekly basis. Praise those accomplishments appropriately.

 Communicate with the school regularly. When you have a concern or question, write a note, or email or phone the teacher. We need you on our team!

Think ahead: at the end of the school year, schedule a meeting to discuss with the teacher your child's successes and challenges.
