To a Library, go!

'To a nunnery, go.' These are the words of Hamlet to Ophelia in Act 3, Scene 1 of Shakespeare's play, 'Hamlet', and I have adapted these immortal words as a holiday recommendation to the learners of Glen Austin High - 'To a <u>library</u>, go!'

They say that leaders are readers, and this is not only true in survey results which found that CEOs and other top leaders read remarkably more books than others, but is also evident in the grammar, vocabulary and conceptualisation of learners who read. Their writing style is easy and effortless, whereas the non-readers have essays peppered with teacher's red ink.

In his book, 'Digital Cocaine' by Brad Huddleston, the author likens the digital effect on the brain to other addiction forming substance (such as alcohol), the three symptoms being: anger – the meltdowns when you try to remove it; anxiety and depression, and emotional numbness. So instead of allowing children to binge on youtube and Netflix, Huddleston's advice is digital moderation and exercise – mine is the obvious alternative: reading.

I have always felt that with the right book, the printed word is favoured over the electronic screen – and I emphasize 'with the right book' ... it has to be a book that the individual finds fascinating or highly enjoyable i.e. suits the interest and literacy level of the child. The acid test would be a child reading in the company of a switched-off TV. No, this is not fantasy land, but does require some pointers to parents in the selection of books for their children, in answer to their common questions, i.e.

Where do I get books from?

What should they read?

How can I be encouraging and supportive in their reading programme?

How can my children actively build a stronger vocabulary from reading?

In answer to Point 1, Midrand has a wonderful library in Halfway House, so you don't have to buy books and spend your precious bonus. What to read (Point 2) is presented in many recommended reading lists e.g. BBC Book Club and the Oprah Book Club – simply google. Children should always choose fiction or non-fiction books they are truly interested in, and one can judge the content by simply reading the blurb on the cover, and sampling pages within to see if the standard and style is appealing. Regarding Point 3, parents are a child's best role model, so become a library member yourself, and have dinner-table discussions on the books you are reading, and how they have affected your views. Teens love debating and proving their points, so reading presents good subject matter for them to apply their knowledge and realise the benefits of broadening their minds.

And finally, expanding their vocabulary (Point 4) is best done by writing down new words in an A5 hard-cover index book, and asking your children how many new words they learnt that day. I know this is an 'old school' practice, but it works. Kids love learning new words, which makes them feel more intellectual and elite. You could also turn vocabulary into a game, or simply buy them a scrabble set for Christmas. Teens love good competition!

So, in conclusion, I am sure that Shakespeare, the master of words, would excuse me with his blessing, when I recommend to learners that during these holidays, they 'To a library, go'
